2. No Foreign Service maintenance personnel are presently available at Pretoria, Moscow, Ottawa, or Singapore. Attaches in these areas will be notified separately by the Army Security Agency, Washington, D.C. of the arrangements for the servicing of their equipment.

3. Normally the Foreign Service communication technicians will maintain Attache machines only on scheduled visits and, because of the time and expense incurred by additional travel, will not be subject to call from their home stations. However, in case of an extreme emergency when rapid cryptographic communication is essential, a Military Attache is authorized to request such maintenance service. This request, however, should be made by the Attache to the local Foreign Service establishment rather than direct to the Foreign Service establishment where the technician is located.

4. Commanding Generals of United States Army Commands are authorized to provide maintenance for Department of State cryptographic equipment at Foreign Service posts whenever such service is requested and can conveniently be performed. The arrangements which have been made with the Department of State are for the purpose of mutual assistance, and the development of methods most efficient and economical to the Government. It is urged that the mutual assistance aspect be emphasized in connection with this procedure.
