I. INATIS

2. FLLTCHER CISE

Er. Sterlig advised that he had bushed around Fr. 3. QUALIFRATION STATLARLS FOR APPOINTMENT IN FR SCHELULE B

In sply to Dr. Finkov's inquiry regarding the cate to expect to receive Schedule B. Ur. to rice indicated that he had talked to a member of the Civil Service Corrission the cild that, though the Civil Service Rules are againing the President's right-ture, per of the holes was recuire Congressional approval which will mean further delay of

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this is the case, Er. Starlin sill attempt to obtain approval of Schedule B authority for all positions assigned exclusively to Army Communications Intelligence activities prior to the President's approval of the complete Civil Service Rules. Lr. Sinkov goanted out that in the meetings held in his Livision in connection with special qualification atenderes to study positions and try to decide which ones should be included under special considerations for certain kinds of experience, they had found it difficult to know where to draw a hard and fast line as to which jobs are of the type for which special cryptographic training sould be of particular value. In many -crimistrative positions, for example, or even typing jobs, a knowledge of the work The Affrey is very important for efficiency. In view of this situation, Dr. Sinkov .minba that the simplest solution to the problem might be to suggest the L double time in experience within the igency (or equivalent crypt work as suggested by Captain Searby) should be created for all positions within the Agency, rather than try to list certain execusio oner. Fr. Starlin indicated, however, that he did not think the Commission would go along with us in granting double tire for experience in lobs which are corron throughout the government, as typicts and administrative assistants, but wither that we will have to stick to jobs in a specialized category. Ir. Sinkov further states that it seemed to him that the history of special cualification stancards is a par tire history, and he condered whether all these standards would die as soon as the emergency is declared at an end if all our qualifications would have to be rewritten snyway. Ir. Sterlin said that all indications point to the fact that we cannot continue under Schedule A such longer, and, though we will continue to use it until instructions are received to discontinue, we will have to decide on the qualificetion standards to be used thereafter. Er. Starlin further explainer, in reply to Lr. Kulltack's inquiry relative to the methods of setting up qualifications, that under Schedule E we can hire anyone who is cualified. As to what qualification standards will be used, that must be an arrangement worked out between the Agency and the Civil Service Commission. If we want to continue to use the present Schedule A standards under Schedule P we will have to make an agreement with the Commission to co so. If we decide upon new atandards, we will likewise have to work out an arrangement to the mutual satisfaction of the 'gency and the Commission, then se can hire anyone was satisfies those qualification standards. Lr. Eullback wished to know who is the judge of whether a person qualified. Wr. Starlin replied that the appointing officer coeides, but he feels that for the higher grade positions a panel of techniciens should be appointed who could judge on the cuslifiertions of applicants for particular jobs. Ir. Iullback asked whether people streety incumtent on jobs would have to have their qualifications reconsidered if he submit a new set of standards to the Complesion, and Er. Eterlin replied that they would unless the Commission gives us blanket authority to transfer everyone to Schedule F. Ir. Rowlett indicated that he feels we should continue to go along counting crypt experience double as we have in the past. It was agreed that if, in setting up new standards, we will disqualify half the prople we already have, it would be better to continue with present standards. Lr. Sinkov ver excused from the meeting to keep an appointment and the matter of qualification standards was tabled until the next reeting.

4. APTITULL TESTING PRODRAY

It was indicated that the esterial on the aptitude testing program has been bucked to all members of the Ecore and is now in the hands of Col. Frier. Er. Starlin asked for discussion of the subject and Er. Rowlett recommended that we forget the program completely. This topic was also tabled until the next secting.

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
