I am grateful to you for the time you took to write me your interesting and detailed letter dated 26 April 1954. It appears that you went to a great deal of trouble to prepare something especially for me, when I had in mind only that you might send me a copy of a lecture you were scheduled to deliver before the Bacon Society.

Please be assured that I have read you letter with care, but I hope you will not be disappointed if I tell you sincerely that I am fully aware of all you included in your letter and its accompanying synopsis of your proposed lecture.
